
MORE TO EXPLORE

Read about Minnesotans from history

Individual Minnesotans have shaped our history and fought for civil rights since before the birth of our state! Get an introduction to some of the most influential individuals and groups from Minnesota's African American, Native American, and immigrant communities with the Minnesota Historical Society's online encyclopedia, MNOpedia!* You can also learn more about some of these individuals, like Nellie Francis and Fredrick L. McGhee, by reading their biographies.

Frank Boyd Park in St. Paul bears the name of an early 20th century leader in the African American community who helped bring a chapter of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters Union to St. Paul.

Visit a historical marker

Historical markers around Minnesota recognize the locations of numerous events from the history of our state. A list of more than 2,000 such markers spread across Minnesota can be found at the Historical Marker Database. Check out the list to find markers near you!



The Spiral for Justice on the Minnesota State Capitol Mall honors Roy Wilkins. The civil rights leader and former head of the NAACP grew up in St. Paul's Rondo neighborhood and attended the University of Minnesota.

Bungo Township in Cass County is named for George Bonga. Born around 1802, Bonga the first known Black man to be born in present-day Minnesota.
